



Additional Funding: Scholarships, Grants, Fellowships

<p>Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing</p>	<p><u>George H. Nofer Scholarship for Law and Public Policy</u></p> <p>To support students with hearing impairments thrive in an educational setting. Applicants must be full-time graduate students with a pre-lingual bilateral hearing loss in the moderately-severe to profound range, use listening and spoken language as their primary method of communication, and who are attending an accredited mainstream law school or a masters or doctoral program in public policy or public administration. Awards are \$5,000.</p>
<p>Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation</p>	<p><u>Graduate Merit & Need Scholarships</u></p> <p>The Alpha Kappa Alpha Educational Advancement Foundation, Inc. (EAF) provides funds to advance education in fulfillment of its mission: “To promote life-long learning.” This is accomplished by securing charitable funds to award scholarships and grants. The Foundation is a source of support to graduate students, post freshman students and non-profit organizations serving diverse beneficiaries. Foundation scholarships and grants are awarded without regard to gender, race, creed, age, sexual orientation, ethnicity or disability. The only means to obtain an application is through the website. Merit scholarships are awarded to graduate students; this is a one-year award.</p>
<p>American Association of University Women (AAUW)</p>	<p>AAUW’s <u>Career Development Grants</u> provide assistance to women who, through additional higher education, technical training, or participation in professional development institutes, are making career changes, seeking to advance in current careers, or reentering the workforce. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing credentials in nontraditional fields.</p> <p><u>International Fellowships</u></p> <p>International Fellowships are awarded for full-time study or research in the United States to women who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Both graduate and postgraduate studies at accredited U.S. institutions are supported.</p>
<p>American Planning Association</p>	<p><u>The Robert A. Catlin/David W. Long Scholarship</u></p> <p>Applicants must be African American undergraduate students who have been accepted in an urban planning program for graduate studies and graduate students, of the same affiliation, majoring in urban planning or a related field (environmental studies, geography, urban studies, urban policy etc.) Current graduate students may not be in the final semester of their programs.</p>
<p>American Psychological Association</p>	<p><u>Annette Urso Rickel Foundation Dissertation Award for Public Policy</u></p> <p>The APF Annette Urso Rickel Foundation Dissertation Award for Public Policy supports dissertation research on public policy, which has the potential to improve services for children and families facing psychosocial issues such as prevention of child abuse, school programs for children with psychological issues, services for youth in the criminal justice system, healthy parenting, math and science education, and contributing to the adoption of sound policy affecting children, youth and families.</p>



American Indian Graduate Center Graduate Fellowships	<p>The American Indian Graduate Center (AIGC) Fellowship program provides approximately \$1,200,000 in fellowships to over 400 American Indian and Alaska Native graduate and professional students each year. Graduate fellowships are monetary awards made to American Indian and Alaska Native graduate or professional full-time, degree-seeking students, who meet all eligibility criteria. The fellowship amount is typically between \$1000 and \$5000 per academic year (not including summer), and varies from year to year, depending on the number of qualified applicants, the availability of funds and unmet financial need. (Multiple fellowship types available)</p>
Air & Waste Management Association	<p>Milton Feldstein Memorial Scholarships</p> <p>To support the future of fields of air and waste management and to help students improve their knowledge and skills in air quality research. Applicants must be full-time graduate students pursuing courses of study and research leading to careers in air quality, waste management, environmental management/policy/law, and/or sustainability during the academic year. Awards are \$7,000.</p> <p>Dave Benferado Scholarship</p> <p>To support the future of fields of air and waste management and to help students improve their knowledge and skills in air pollution control and waste minimization research. Applicants must be full-time graduate students pursuing courses of study and research leading to careers in air quality, waste management, environmental management/policy/law, and/or sustainability during the academic year.</p>
Association of American Indian Affairs	<p>Sequoyah Graduate Scholarship</p> <p>Recognizing that most students have exhausted federal funding that was previously available to them as undergraduate students, as well as the lack of scholarships available to Native American graduate students, AAIA established the Sequoyah Graduate Scholarship in efforts to help fill this need. This scholarship is open to students in any curriculum who are seeking a Master's Degree or above. This scholarship is funded through AAIA's general scholarship fund, which without the generosity of our donors and members, would not be possible.</p> <p>AAIA Allogan Slagle Memorial Scholarship</p> <p>For students from tribes that are not recognized by the federal government.</p>
Association of University Programs in Health Administration	<p>David A. Winston Health Policy Scholarship</p> <p>To increase the number and quality of individuals trained in healthcare policy at the state and federal level. Applicants must be current first year graduate students in their second full-time equivalent semester or third full-time equivalent quarter for those in two-year programs or for those in longer programs, their next to final year, studying at any AUPHA or ASPPH member graduate program; must be scheduled to complete the didactic portion of their degree not later than December of the year following the awarding of the scholarship; must be U.S. citizens; applicants from health policy, public policy, health administration, business, economics, and law graduate programs (e.g. MPH, MPP, MHA, MBA, MA, JD) as well as joint degree programs (e.g. JD/MPH) are strongly encouraged to apply; students of all political ideological perspectives are encouraged to apply. \$10,000 awarded in funds.</p>



Association of California Water Agencies	<p><u>Stephen K. Hall ACWA Water Law & Policy Scholarship</u></p> <p>Sponsored by the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) in memory of a respected water leader who lost his lengthy battle with Lou Gehrig’s disease at the age of 58, the Stephen K. Hall Water Law and Policy Scholarship is bestowed annually for \$7,000 upon an outstanding graduate student majoring in law, public policy, or public administration with a focus in California water resources. Eligible applicants must be carrying at least eight credits per term at a public or private graduate school in the United States.</p>
Bill Raskob Foundation	<p><u>Interest-Free Student Loans</u></p> <p>The Bill Raskob Foundation aids students through educational loans at no interest. In order to qualify, you must be an American citizen enrolled at an accredited institution for the upcoming school year. At present, the Foundation is not accepting applications from foreign students, US students graduating from a foreign school, for first-year study (undergraduate), medical students (except those funded last year) or correspondence courses.</p> <p>The Foundation does not award scholarships, grants or gifts. Academic proficiency is a factor of importance, but need is given first consideration. The Board of Trustees also consider demonstrated self-reliance, character, willingness to assume responsibility and capacity for leadership, as evidenced by performance. The amount of aid is dependent upon need. The minimum loan amount is \$1,000 and the average loan is for \$5,000. Parents (when applicable) are expected to assist an applicant to the full extent of their ability. Applicants applying for aid are expected to demonstrate that they have exhausted the opportunities for assistance in their local community and school.</p>
Bullitt Foundation	<p><u>Environmental Fellowship</u></p> <p>The Bullitt Environmental Fellowship is a two-year, \$50,000/year fellowship for graduate students interested in pursuing leadership positions within the environmental field. The Fellowship is offered in memory of longtime Foundation Chair, Priscilla Bullitt Collins. In her honor, an outstanding, environmentally knowledgeable graduate student from a community under-represented in the environmental movement, who has demonstrated exceptional capacity for leadership as well as scholarship, will receive the fellowship award. The Foundation encourages applications from a broad diversity of students, with a particular emphasis on students of color and others who have overcome discrimination or other significant hardships.</p>
Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Program	<p><u>Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Program</u></p> <p>The program supports U.S. citizens through two years of graduate study, internships and professional development activities, and entry into the Foreign Service, particularly minority groups historically underrepresented in the Foreign Service and those with financial need.</p>
College of Fine and Applied Arts	<p><u>Kate Neal Kinley Memorial Fellowship</u></p> <p>The fellowships are to be used by the recipients toward defraying the expenses of advanced study in the United States or abroad. The fellowships are open to graduates of the College of Fine and Applied Arts of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and to graduates of similar institutions of equal educational standing whose principal or major studies have been in the fields of architecture, art, dance, landscape architecture, music, theatre, and urban and regional planning. Awards range from up to \$9,000 to \$20,000 depending on field of study.</p>



Center for Human Rights at the UW	<p><u>Dr. Lisa Sable Brown Endowed Fund for Human Rights</u></p> <p>The Dr. Lisa Sable Brown Fund provides financial resources to benefit graduate students to study and/or conduct research about human rights. The committee may combine this fellowship with the Mack and Mayerfeld fellowship to make a more substantial award. Priority will be given to graduate student research that identifies acts of oppression of an individual's human rights and advocates abolishing such practices that may be viewed as a form of "slavery." They anticipate distributing \$1,900 in funding for 2019.</p> <p><u>Peter Mack and Jamie Mayerfeld Fund</u></p> <p>The Peter Mack and Jamie Mayerfeld Fund provides financial resources to benefit graduate students to study and/or conduct research about human rights. They anticipate distributing \$4,000 in funding for 2019.</p>
Daughters of the American Revolution	<p><u>DAR American Indian Scholarship</u></p> <p>This scholarship is awarded to help Native Americans students of any age, any tribe and in any state striving to get an education at the undergraduate or graduate levels. However, undergraduate students are given preference. All awards are judged based on financial need and academic achievement. Applicants must be Native Americans (proof of American Indian blood is required by letter or proof papers) in financial need and have a grade point average of 3.25 or higher. There will be no exceptions. This is a one-time \$4,000 award.</p>
Danziger & De Llano, LLP	<p><u>Mesothelioma.net Scholarship</u></p> <p>Danziger & De Llano, LLP. is now offering qualifying college students the chance to win a \$2000 scholarship for detailing their personal experiences either living with cancer or watching a loved one battle cancer. One scholarship will be awarded in September 2019. The law firm hopes to offer this financial assistance to help one deserving student meet their academic goals.</p> <p>Any student who has lived with and fought against any type of cancer, not limited to mesothelioma, is welcome to apply. The firm also encourages any students who have watched a family member or close friend go through the experience of fighting cancer.</p>
Davis Putter Scholarship Fund	<p><u>Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund</u></p> <p>The Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund aids people active in movements for social and economic justice. These need-based scholarships are awarded to students who are able to do academic work at the college or university level or are enrolled in a trade or technical program and who are active in the progressive movement. Early recipients worked for civil rights, against McCarthyism and for peace in Vietnam. Recent grantees have been active in the struggle against racism, sexism, homophobia and other forms of oppression; building the movement for economic justice; and creating peace through international anti-imperialist solidarity. Applicants must have participated in activities in the US, and there is a strong preference for applicants who plan on working in this country.</p> <p>The maximum grant available from the Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund is \$15,000 per year (from July 1 through June 30).</p>



Dolores Zorhab Liebmann Fund	<p><u>Dolores Zorhab Liebmann Fund</u></p> <p>Fellowships for U.S. citizens in any recognized field of the humanities, social sciences, or natural sciences with outstanding undergraduate record and financial need. Fellowships cover the cost of tuition and provide an annual \$18,000 stipend for living expenses. Publication grants vary depending on magnitude of the publication.</p>
Donald Payne Fellowship	<p><u>Donald Payne Fellowship</u></p> <p>The Donald Payne Fellowship seeks to attract outstanding young people who are interested in pursuing careers in the Foreign Service of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID). The fellowship covers up to \$90,000 worth of graduate study, internships and professional development.</p>
Education Northwest	<p><u>Steven R. Nelson Native Educator Scholarship Program</u></p> <p>This scholarship program strives to increase Native representation in the field of education by providing financial support, mentoring, and internships for Native students in the Northwest who are pursuing a master’s degree in education policy, leadership, technical assistance, research, or a closely related field. We view this program as an opportunity to create long-term partnerships that will improve our ability to meet the needs of Native communities. Awardees will receive a maximum of \$5,000 each year, and we will award as many as five scholarships per year—one for a resident of each state in our primary service region of Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington.</p>
Foundation For Community Association Research	<p><u>Byron Hanke Fellowship</u></p> <p>The Foundation for Community Association Research (FCAR) awards its Byron Hanke Fellowship to selected graduate students to implement research projects related to the development, management and governance of common interest communities and their community associations. Applicants must be enrolled, at time of application and through the research period, in a graduate level program (masters, doctoral, legal) at an accredited higher education institution in the United States or Canada. Students from any relevant discipline may apply for the Hanke Fellowship, provided their research project relates to community associations and/or common interest communities.</p>
United States Department Education Office of International and Foreign Language Education	<p><u>Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships</u></p> <p>The Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships program provides allocations of academic year and summer fellowships to institutions of higher education or consortia of institutions of higher education to assist meritorious undergraduate students and graduate students undergoing training in modern foreign languages and related area or international studies. FLAS Fellowships support undergraduate, graduate and professional students in acquiring modern foreign languages and area or international studies competencies. Students from all UW departments and schools are encouraged to apply.</p> <p>FLAS Fellows receive:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">● Academic Year Graduate: \$18,000 tuition, \$15,000 living stipend● Academic Year Undergraduate: \$10,000 tuition,\$5,000 living stipend● Summer Graduate/Undergraduate: \$5,000 tuition,\$2,500 living stipend



Government Finance Officers Association	<p>GOLDBERG-MILLER PUBLIC FINANCE SCHOLARSHIP</p> <p>Funded by the Girard Miller Foundation and administered by the Government Finance Officers' Association of the U.S. and Canada (GFOA), this prestigious \$10,000 scholarship is awarded to one graduate student each year. In addition to the monetary assistance, the recipient receives an all-expenses paid trip to the GFOA's annual conference, where they will be presented with their award.</p> <p>Minorities in Government Finance Scholarship</p> <p>Another scholarship administered by the GFOA is the Minorities in Government Finance Scholarship. The award of \$5,000 is granted to an outstanding graduate student who belongs to one of the following groups: Black/African American, American Indian, Asian, native Hawaiian or other Pacific islander, Hispanic or Latino. Like the Daniel B. Goldberg Scholarship, this award comes with a paid trip to the annual GFOA conference.</p> <p>GOVERNMENT FINANCE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP</p> <p>In 2010, GFOA's Executive Board voted to create the Government Finance Professional Development Scholarship to support the studies of part-time students with a career interest in state and local government finance.</p> <p>FRANK L. GREATHOUSE GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTING SCHOLARSHIP</p> <p>In 1987, the GFOA's executive board voted to create a Government Accounting Scholarship to recognize outstanding performance in accounting studies and to encourage careers in state and local government.</p>
Harry Bridges Center for Labor Studies	<p>Labor Studies Awards and Fellowships</p> <p>Are you an undergrad passionate about social justice? A graduate student writing a dissertation on a labor-related topic? A busy activist building a student group or union campaign?</p> <p>You are in luck! Each year, the Harry Bridges Center for Labor Studies awards over \$50,000 in scholarships and fellowships to students at the University of Washington. The awards are available to students at multiple stages of education and experience, from incoming freshman to senior graduate students. Individual award amounts range from \$1,000 to \$10,000. Students at any of the three University of Washington campuses (Seattle, Bothell or Tacoma) are eligible to apply.</p> <p>By submitting the on-line application, you will be considered for all Labor Studies awards you qualify for. The deadline to apply for 2020-2021 is Monday, April 6, 2020.</p>
Harry S. Truman Scholarship	<p>Harry S. Truman Scholarship</p>



	<p>Harry S. Truman Scholarship provides merit-based award offered to U.S. citizens and U.S. nationals with Junior-level academic standing who want to prepare for a career in public service by attending graduate school in the U.S. or abroad.</p>
<p>Hispanic Scholarship Fund</p>	<p>Hispanic Scholarship Fund Hispanic Scholarship Fund provides funding for undergraduate and graduate students of Hispanic heritage. Awards are based on merit; amounts range from \$500 to \$5,000, based on relative need, among the Scholars selected.</p>
<p>Islamic Scholarship Fund</p>	<p>The Islamic Scholarship ISF increases American Muslim representation in media and politics in order to improve public opinion and policy. Since 2009, ISF has awarded 280 scholarships and grants totaling \$857,100. In 2017, it awarded 61 scholarships and grants, a total of \$200,00. ISF scholarships range from \$2,000-\$10,000.</p>
<p>InFaith Community Foundation</p>	<p>WomenLead Scholarship Fund To promote diverse leadership in ministry, nonprofits, and civic organizations by providing financial support for women pursuing a Masters or PhD that will prepare them to serve in public service, non-profit leadership, and/or in Christian ministry. Women pursuing a Master or PhD in Christian ministry, government, public service/administration, educational policy, nonprofit management, philanthropy, public health, and/or advocacy or related. The ideal candidate(s) will give clear examples demonstrating and articulating: a drive to be an extraordinary leader with capacity to make a difference on a broad scale to impact systems level change; How their faith has influenced, shaped and/or inspired them to educate, advocate and activate their passion for justice and change; Express a vision and spirit of possibility; Give clear, concrete examples of how they have led and/or implemented a course of action to create change in their community.</p>
<p>Japanese American Citizens League</p>	<p>The Japanese American Citizens League (JACL) National Scholarship and Awards Program The Japanese American Citizens League (JACL) National Scholarship and Awards Program offer scholarships to students in particular categories: undergraduate, graduate, law, financial need, and creative & performing arts. The program currently offers over 30 awards, with an annual total of over \$70,000 in scholarships to qualified students nationwide. Every applicant must be an active National JACL member. JACL membership is open to <i>everyone</i> of <i>any</i> ethnic background. All who meet eligibility criteria are welcomed and encouraged to apply. Applicants must be planning to attend full time at a college, university, trade school, business school, or any other institution of higher learning within the United States at the undergraduate or graduate school level in the fall of 2020. All scholarships are one-time awards.</p>
<p>Korean American Scholarship Foundation</p>	<p>Western Region Scholarship Korean American Scholarship Foundation (KASF) offers scholarships ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 to qualified Korea American students (including foreign students from Korea). All applicants must be enrolled in a full-time program in designated states during the scholarship application year. Can demonstrate need for financial assistance. Eligible applicants:</p>

<p>Mortar Board Alumni/Tolo Foundation</p>	<p><u>Mortar Board Alumni/Tolo Foundation Scholarships</u></p> <p>Mortar Board Alumni/Tolo Foundation annually recognizes UW sophomores, juniors, seniors, and graduate students based on distinguished achievement in scholarship, leadership and service to the campus and community. The Foundation awards over \$45,000 in total scholarships each year. Students from all fields of study are invited to apply. Membership in Mortar Board is not required.</p>
<p>MPOWER Financing</p>	<p><u>MPOWER Global Citizen Scholarship</u></p> <p>MPOWER seeks to create globally-minded, multi-lingual, culturally-competent graduates poised to take on the world’s most pressing problems in science, technology, business, and public policy. In recognition of students’ extraordinary potential, we’ve created the MPOWER Global Citizen Scholarship. We’ve intentionally designed this scholarship program to be as broad as possible to match the broad, diverse experiences of international students. Scholarships awarded annually to international and DACA students enrolled at Universities MPOWER supports. For the cycle ending July 15, 2019, we will be awarding one \$5,000 grand prize scholarship to the most outstanding applicant worldwide, plus an additional four \$3,000 regional scholarships. These regional scholarships will be awarded to one student from each of the following countries/regions: India, Asia (excluding India), Latin America/Caribbean, and Africa. <p>National Academy of Public Administration</p>	<p><u>The Herbert Roback Scholarship</u></p> <p>Administered by the National Academy of Public Administration (NAPA), this scholarship awards \$7,500 to a student admitted to or currently enrolled in full-time graduate study of public administration, public service or political science. In addition to the monetary award, the recipient also receives an invitation to the annual meeting of the NAPA.</p>
<p>National Forum for Black Public Administrators</p>	<p><u>CIGNA Healthcare Scholarships</u></p> <p>In an effort to support the education and development of African-American students and prepare them for careers in public administration, CIGNA HealthCare, a member of the NFBPA National Corporate Advisory Council will offer three scholarships to three students preferably attending Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU).</p> <p><u>CPS HUMAN RESOURCE SERVICES SCHOLARSHIP</u></p> <p>The Walter Vaughn Excellence in Human Resources Scholarship in the amount of \$2,500 will be awarded to a deserving graduate or undergraduate student currently enrolled in a traditional, four year accredited college or university, preferably an HBCU, to support their education and development. The scholarship, established by CPS Human Resource Services, is designed to promote and encourage advancement in the practice of Human Resource Management and to develop strategic leaders pursuing studies in the field of human resource management. This scholarship is offered in furtherance of NFBPA’s goal of lending support to African American and other minority students interested in leadership roles in public service.</p>



	<p><u>Willie T. Loud Scholarship</u></p> <p>The Willie T. Loud Scholarship will be awarded to an undergraduate or graduate student pursuing a career in public service. Since 1997, this scholarship of \$5,000, has been awarded to a deserving student (preferably attending an HBCU) pursuing a career in public administration, urban affairs, or a related field. This scholarship is designed to assist NFBPA to further achieve its mission of grooming the next generation of African Americans or other minorities for careers in public service.</p>
<p>Open Society Foundations</p>	<p><u>Civil Society Leadership Awards</u></p> <p>The Civil Society Leadership Awards (CSLA) provide fully-funded scholarships for master’s degree study to individuals who clearly demonstrate academic and professional excellence and a deep commitment to leading positive social change in their communities.</p> <p>Awards for applicants from an eligible country are available in several areas of study, including Communications, Economics, Gender Studies, Law, Public and Social Policy, and more.</p>
<p>Pat Tillman Foundation</p>	<p><u>Tilman Scholar Program</u></p> <p>The scholarship is open to active duty members, veterans, spouses, and surviving spouses who are attending (or plan to attend) a U.S. based college. The scholarship assists with academic expenses, and can be used for tuition and fees, living expenses, and books. Tillman Scholars can expect an average award of \$10,000. Founded in 2008, the program supports active-duty service members, veterans and their spouses with academic scholarships, a national network and professional development opportunities, so they are empowered to make an impact at home and around the world.</p>
<p>Pride Foundation</p>	<p><u>Pride Foundation Scholarships</u></p> <p>Pride Foundation Scholarships support LGBTQ+ and allied students who are facing incredible barriers, regardless of school, major, or GPA.</p>
<p>The Point Foundation Scholarship</p>	<p><u>The Point Foundation Scholarship</u></p> <p>The Point Foundation Scholarship empowers promising LGBTQ graduate students to achieve their full academic and leadership potential – despite the obstacles often put before them – to make a significant impact on society.</p>
<p>The Gay Asian Pacific Alliance Foundation (GAPA)</p>	<p><u>Gay Asian Pacific Alliance (GAPA) Foundation Scholarship</u></p> <p>The Gay Asian Pacific Alliance Foundation (GAPA) is a grassroots philanthropic organization that provides funds and leverages resources to empower the Asian/Pacific Islander LGBTQ community. The purpose of the GAPA Foundation Scholarship is to celebrate and reward outstanding scholar activists who are making a positive impact on the API and LGBTQ communities. High school seniors, undergraduate, graduate, and trade/vocational school students are encouraged to apply.</p> <p>The GAPA Foundation Scholarship will range from \$1000–\$5000, and several scholarships may be awarded in a calendar year. In addition, one outstanding applicant will be awarded the Donald Masuda Memorial Scholarship (co-funded by the Lacuna Giving Circle).</p>



Seattle Foundation	<p><u>Doyne M. Green Scholarship</u> To support and honor female graduate students of medicine, law or social and public services. This scholarship is available to students who have completed at least one year of graduate work.</p> <p><u>Joan Hill Scholarship</u> The Joan Hill Scholarship is available to all students regardless of their class standing but this scholarship gives preference to students that have experienced adversity outside of the classroom and have shown perseverance and determination in overcoming that adversity.</p> <p><u>Walter H. Meyer - Garry L. White Memorial Scholarship</u> This scholarship is directed specifically to returning adult students who are either attending or prepared to attend a 2- or 4-year public or private university, at the graduate or undergraduate level. Stephen Bufton Memorial Education Fund Scholarships	<p><u>The Stephen Bufton Memorial Educational Fund (SBMEF)</u> SBMEF exists to provide educational grants and scholarships to women pursuing post secondary educational goals as well as ongoing professional development. SBMEF has been supporting businesswomen for more than 50 years. The fund assists women pursuing advanced educational goals enabling them to achieve business and professional success. National scholarships are awarded each year in the amounts of \$5,000 to \$10,000. Requirements vary by award category, but all require that applicants be women U.S. citizens who will be attending an accredited U.S. college or university that offers at least a baccalaureate degree.</p>
The Stonewall Foundation	<p><u>Traub-Dicker Rainbow Scholarship</u> The Traub-Dicker Rainbow Scholarship was established by Peggy Traub and Phyllis Dicker to encourage and support women-identified lesbians in their pursuit of higher education. This program provides one-year scholarships of \$1,500 or \$3,000 to those graduating high school or already enrolled in college in any year of study, including graduate school. Scholarships are paid directly to the recipient’s school and are applied toward tuition. <p>Thomas R. Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowships</p>	<p>The Thomas R. Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowship Program</p> <p>The Thomas R. Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowship Program is a program funded by the U.S. Department of State, administered by Howard University, that attracts and prepares outstanding young people for Foreign Service careers in the U.S. Department of State. It welcomes the application of members of minority groups historically underrepresented in the State Department, women, and those with financial need. Based on the fundamental principle that diversity is a strength in our diplomatic efforts, the program values varied backgrounds, including ethnic, racial, social, and geographic diversity.</p> <p>The Pickering Fellowship offers a unique opportunity to promote positive change in the world. Upon successful completion of a two-year master’s degree program and fulfillment of Foreign Service entry requirements, fellows have the opportunity to work as Foreign Service Officers in accordance with applicable law and State Department policy, serving in Washington, DC and at a U.S. embassy, consulate, or diplomatic mission around the globe. Fellows also agree to a minimum five-year service commitment in the Department of State’s Foreign Service. The five-year service commitment begins upon entry into the Foreign Service.</p>
<p>United States Department Education Office of International and Foreign Language Education</p>	<p>Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships</p> <p>The Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships program provides allocations of academic year and summer fellowships to institutions of higher education or consortia of institutions of higher education to assist meritorious undergraduate students and graduate students undergoing training in modern foreign languages and related area or international studies. FLAS Fellowships support undergraduate, graduate and professional students in acquiring modern foreign languages and area or international studies competencies. Washington State Business and Professional Women's Foundation	<p><u>Washington State Business and Professional Women's Foundation Scholarships</u></p> <p>WSBPW offers several educational scholarships, including scholarships for women age 30+; single women with children; women pursuing careers in journalism, communication, horticulture, or business; minority women veterans; and women who are residents of South King County. Scholarships range from \$500 to \$1,000.</p>
Washington Indian Gaming Association (WIGA)	<p><u>The Washington Indian Gaming Association (WIGA) Scholarship Program</u></p> <p>WIGA educates the Indian gaming community, the public and all levels of government about gaming issues in Indian country. The WIGA Scholarship Program is designed to promote tribal self-sufficiency by providing scholarships for Native American students in Washington seeking to advance their own self-sufficiency and broaden their personal and professional potential through higher education. Enrolled members of the WIGA tribes, and state residents enrolled in other tribes, are eligible. The scholarships are awarded to students pursuing degrees at community and technical colleges, four-year colleges, and post-graduate and professional schools. The Washington Indian Gaming Association (WIGA) is pleased to announce that \$100,000 will be awarded to 37 Native American students for scholarships in the 2019-20 school year. Scholarship recipients are students who come from or attend school in Washington State.</p>
Washington Policy Center	<p><u>Jennifer Dunn-Thomson Scholarship</u></p> <p>Washington Policy Center will award its annual Jennifer Dunn-Thomson scholarship to a female student who embodies the late Congresswoman's values of leadership, commitment to public service and personal values. From the \$15,000 in total scholarship funds available, recipients may use the money to pay for tuition or an internship on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C. WPC will help the recipients with an internship placement with a member of Congress. Applicants must be female and enrolled as an undergraduate or graduate student during the 2019-2020 academic year. They must have completed their first year of education at an institution of higher learning.</p>
Washington Trail Blazers	<p><u>Trail Blazers Scholarship</u></p> <p>The Washington Trail Blazers hope to offer a qualified student a \$1,000 one-time scholarship. The 2018 scholarship is being offered in the memory of Jack Rollo. The Trail Blazers are most interested in assisting students who seek a career that will enhance the management of wilderness, natural resources and fisheries science in Washington State's mountains. Applicants will be judged on the criteria of scholarship, leadership, integrity and other personal achievements.
